You are also required to **annotate** in your books. Use your preferred methods – underline, circle, highlight--and also write brief notes and responses in the margins. Annotating your text forces you to read actively, think critically, and respond thoughtfully. This is an essential skill to practice.

You should annotate and complete the Close Reading Notes as you read. The Summary Analysis and Writing Responses can be completed when you have finished reading.

The attached assignments are due on the first day of school in August. You can also expect a short quiz on each book when you return.
